

The Sustainable Futures Festival aimed to create positive change, with innovative and practical solutions for a sustainable and regenerative world, working in partnership with local communities, businesses and governments.

We held the festival between June and September 2022. It culminated with a festival day on 11 September that involved displays, speakers and

a marketplace for innovative technologies that are sustainable and environmentally sound.

This bulletin summarises the findings from an evaluation conducted in collaboration with The University of Newcastle and drawing from attendance data, a confidential survey, feedback from children, media monitoring, communication logs, a waste audit and facilitated discussions.

## What were the main benefits of the festival?

With over 1000 people attending the festival and with the 94% people surveyed indicating they had a positive experience, the top three benefits cited were:

1. Creating a positive atmosphere for learning about sustainability

The experience of interacting as a likeminded community, talking about practical sustainability, finding entertaining ways of learning and showcasing alternative ways of thinking and doing.

2. Supporting the progression of St Philip's Christian College and Tomaree High School towards sustainability

EcoNetwork Port Stephens was proud to learn that St Philip's Christian College has strengthened their recycling program and that Tomaree High School's sustainability and environment program has been revitalised as a result of the festival.


3. Connecting local community groups and businesses with research and innovation expertise

EcoNetwork is aware that new technologies developed in research settings may have practical applications locally, in collaboration with community groups as a result of introductions that occurred at the festival.

## How could the festival improve?

Many survey respondents did not respond to the question about improvements or they replied with statements such as:

'Couldn't fault them' 'Keep up the good work' 'Great festival' 'Don't think they could' 'Location was great' 'Great as is' 'It was excellent overall' 'It was a great day'

Reponses from the children also included:

'Everything that was here' 'Everything and more friends here' 'More of the same' 'Same as what it is today' 'Everything' 'It was awesome' 'The kids activities here were great'

The top four suggested improvements were:

- 1. Increase the quality and quantity of food options
- 2. Increase the reach and variety of advertising and marketing
- 3. Improve the layout to enhance accessibility and interactions between attendees and stallholders
- **4.** Increase the entertainment options and activities targeted at older children and young adults
